

FY 2022 State Budget




Proposed Budget Includes

- \$1.6 billion for pensions
- \$1.4 billion for CMPTRA & Energy Tax Receipts
- \$122.8 million for Transitional Aid
- \$6.5 million Open Space
 PILOT
- \$4.4 million Highlands
 Protection Fund Act



Proposed Budget – Property Tax Relief

- \$21.2 billion property tax relief
 - School Aid: \$17.2 million
 - Municipal Aid: \$1.5 million
 - Other local aid: \$1.09 million
 - Direct Property Tax Relief: \$1.2 million



Proposed Budget - Shared Services

\$10 million for Regional School District Consolidation Grant Program



Proposed Budget \$11.2 Billion

\$6 billion from American Rescue Plan Act

- <u>A-5862/S-3810</u> NJLM opposes
- Expands mandatory non-negotiable items during collective bargaining
- Ignores multilayered & unparalleled protections afforded public sector workers by PERC, Civil Service Commission, Workplace Democracy Act, collective bargaining process, and more...
- Eliminates the function and rights of management to effectively govern its affairs with property taxpayer dollars.

- Expands Non-Negotiables items to include:
 - Layoffs
 - Subcontracting and privatization
 - Criteria and procedures for promotions, performance evaluations and hiring
 - Transfer of employees
 - Assignments and reassignments of employees
 - Transfer of negotiations unit work
 - Job security, discipline disputes and disciplinary reviews

Items are subject to collective negotiations

"unless a negotiated agreement would prevent government from carrying out its statutory mission"



- Creates a definition of "disciplinary review procedures"
- Includes, but not limited to:
 - Oral and written reprimands
 - Written warnings
 - Suspensions with and without pay
 - Fines
 - Terminations
 - Non-renewals
 - Non-reappointments
 - Demotions
 - Disciplinary transfers
 - All other adverse personnel actions based on employee performance or conduct

- Subjects grievance and disciplinary review procedures to binding arbitration
- Provides labor with a broad privileged communication protections
- Creates a disincentive for labor to negotiate what controls when an existing contract expires, and the parties have failed to reach an agreement on a successor contract.
- S-3810 passed Senate Labor 3-2, 2nd reading in Senate
- A-5862 awaiting consideration of Assembly Appropriations Committee

Uniform Regulation of Small Wireless Facility Deployment

- A-1116/S-2674 as amended NJLM opposes
- League initially taken a neutral position working with stakeholders and sponsors.
- The bill's original intended purpose and goal was to provide set standards for the siting of personal wireless providers, small cell equipment.
- Recent amendments
 - limited scope expanded far beyond the original intent of the legislation.
 - includes new equipment, industries, and technology to be included in the siting and deployment regulations.
- League now opposing the bill.

Uniform Regulation of Small Wireless Facility Deployment

- Provides wireless service providers with access to the municipal ROW.
- Sets rates for both access and review.
- Sets a "shot clock" for the review of applications to site small cell facilities within the ROW.
- No requirement placed on the wireless providers to ensure buildout and access to broadband services, even though they are getting preferential treatment to ROW access.

Uniform Regulation of Small Wireless Facility Deployment

League's goal:

Increase access to fast and affordable broadband internet access in order to help bridge the digital divide

- A-1116 is 2nd Reading in Assembly
- S-2674 waiting consideration by Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee.

Off Shore Wind Projects

- S-3926/A-5894 NJLM opposes
- Authorizes certain offshore wind projects to construct power lines and obtain real property interests

 Grants BPU authority to supersede certain local governmental powers upon petition from offshore wind

project.



Off Shore Wind Projects

- Fast-tracked legislation
 - introduced on 6/14/2021 and getting out of committee this week.
- Municipalities would be given 180 days to reach an agreement with offshore wind project owner obtaining easements, ROW, or other real property interest owned by municipality, necessary for the project.
- If an agreement is not reached, project owner can file petition with BPU.
- BPU would have authority to issue an order effectuating the project's property interest.
- Compensation to municipality determine under the Eminent Domain Act.
 - Limited to fair market value.
- Acquisition of easements & other property rights not subject to public bidding.

Off Shore Wind Projects

- If land is currently preserved for conservation or recreation purposes
 - the project owner must acquire land two times the area of the conserved property
 - within three years of the acquisition of the conserved land.
- Authorizes Preemption and Superseding Municipal or County Approvals, Consents or Affirmative Fillings
 - By petition to BPU
 - required to construct a project

Construction Fees

- A-5895/S-3868 NJLM supports
- Require fees collected by UCC in excess of 112% of total cost transfer to current fund
- Amended to require any year UCC fees do not cover operating cost of Construction Department shortfall satisfy by general fund or current fund
- 2nd reading in Assembly & Senate

Social Affair Permits Increase

- A-5310 NJLM supports.
- Increases maximum number of Social Affair Permits from 25 to 52 in one year.
- When:
 - Premise is owned by municipality or
 - Event is sponsor by municipality
- Passed Assembly, 73-0.
- 2nd Reading in Senate.

BPPT (Hopewell v. Verizon)

- A-2991 / S-421 NJLM supports.
- Clarifies telecommunications industry corporate tax responsibilities and shields local taxpayers from the costs of endless tax court litigation.
- Effects more than 130 municipalities in 30 legislative districts.
- Based on a misreading of a 1997 law:
 - Verizon decided that it could exempt itself from the payment of business personal property taxes (BPPT) in any year and in any municipality, when and where it, unilaterally, determined that it provided less than 51% of dial tone service.

BPPT (Hopewell v. Verizon)

- Began in 2008 when Verizon notified some municipalities that it had decided to exempt itself from payment of taxes on all of the cables and electronic equipment it houses in local switching stations.
- Following years, similar decisions by Verizon have led to cases affecting taxpayers in more than a hundred other New Jersey municipalities.
- 2nd Reading in Assembly.
- Waiting consideration by Senate Community and Urban Affairs Committee.

Responsible Dog Ownership Act

- A-2401/S-3607 NJLM opposed as introduced, working on amendments.
- Establishes leashing and fencing requirements by Department of Health to be implemented by municipalities.
- Previously opposed as overly specific and very broad.
- To the detriment of local requirements in favor of a broad state mandate that is difficult to enforce.
- Concerns with definition of "large dog" and whether a municipal official has to decide.
- Creates new revenue stream.
- Concerns:
 - Invisible fencing.
 - Residents in condos, apartments, or townhouses.
 - Renters.
 - Prohibitions on fencing by homeowners' associations.
 - Municipal ordinances on fence size.
- Waiting consideration by Assembly Argiculture Committee & Senate Environment Committee.

- Restores & Revises Urban Enterprise Zones (A-5580/<u>S-3600</u>)
- Local Civilian Police Review Boards (A-4656/S-2963)
- Prohibiting Consideration of Arrest & Citations Police Performance Evaluations (S-1322/A-4058)



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
